HOUSE BILL NO. 5301

AN ACT DECLARING THE PROVINCE OF SOUTHERN LEYTE A MINING – FREE ZONE

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. Short Title. This Act shall be known as the "SOUTHERN 1 2 LEYTE PROVINCE MINING-FREE ZONE ACT." 3 4 SECTION 2. Statement of Policy. It is the policy of the state to protect and advance the right of the people to a balanced and healthful ecology in accord with the 5 rhythm and harmony of nature. 6 7 It is likewise the responsibility of the State to promote the rational exploration, 8 development, utilization and conservation of the country's mineral resources in a way 9 that effectively safeguards the environment and protects the rights of affected 10 communities. 11 Toward this end, the state shall protect the people and the environment in the province of Southern Leyte from the adverse effects of mining. 12

SECTION 3. Declaration of Southern Leyte a Mining-Free and QuarryingTree Zone.- The Province of Southern Leyte is hereby declared a mining-free zone,
and all mining operations therein are hereby prohibited.

SECTION 4. Scope. For purpose of this Act, "mining" refers to the extraction of minerals, ores or other geological materials from the earth. It shall include mining activities such as exploration, feasibility studies, development, utilization and processing as well as quarry operations involving cement raw materials, marble, granite, sand and gravel construction aggregates, whether large-sclae or small-scale operation, and other similar activities related to the excavating and quarrying of minerals and ores. Provided, That the quarrying of gravel and sand for projects directly undertaken by the agencies of the national or city government for basic services such as, but not limited to, roads and bridges, school buildings, water and energy utilities, are exempted from the coverage of this Act.

SECTION 5. *Penal Provisions.* – Any person found violating any of the provisions of this Act shall, upon conviction, be punished with imprisonment of not less than six (6) years and one (1) day, but not more than twelve (12) years, or a fine of not less than one million (Php 1,000,000.00) pesos, but not more than five million (Php 5,000,000.00) pesos, or both, at the discretion of the court of proper jurisdiction.

If the offender is a corporation, partnership, association or any other juridical entity, the penalty shall be served upon the president, managing director or chief operating officer of the offending entity. *Provided*, The license to operate of the erring organization shall be cancelled and revoked permanently. *Provided*, *further*, That the offending corporation or individual shall not be allowed to operate similar establishments under a different name or in a different location.

If the offender is an alien, he shall, after services of sentence or payment of fine, be subject to deportation, and be permanently barred from entering the country.

SECTION 6. Transitory Provision. - Any person or juridical entity granted with an exploration permit, contract, or mineral agreement with the government prior

1	to the effectivity of this Act shall be given a period of one (1) year to cease all mining
2	operations and businesses.
3	Upon the termination of any exploration permit contract, or mineral
4	agreement, the right granted to the contractor to occupy and use the public land shall
5	revert to the Philippine Government.
6	SECTION 7. Implementing Rules and Regulations Within ninety (90)
7	days after the effectivity of this Act, the Department of Environment and Natural
8	Resources shall promulgate the necessary rules and regulations for the proper
9	implementation of this Act.
10	SECTION 8. Repealing Clause All laws, decrees, executive orders and
11	rules and regulations contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are
12	hereby amended accordingly.
13	SECTION 9. Separability Clause If any portion or provision of this Act is
14	declared unconstitutional, the remainder of this Act or any provision not affected
15	thereby shall remain in full force and effect.
16	SECTION 10. Effectivity This Act shall take effect fifteen(15) days after
17	its publication in the official Gazette or in any two (2) newspapers of general
18	circulation.
